We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2019-20 educational progress for the Career Preparation Center. For the 2019-20 school year, schools were identified using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or has a graduation rate at or below 67%. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school has not been given one of these labels.

After reviewing the Core Performance Indicator data in Career and Technical Education Information System (CTEIS), one key challenge for The Career Prep Center pertains to our Nontraditional Concentrators (participation and completion). Special Populations CTE data shows that 8.3% of our Nontraditional students are performing below the state targets. Essentially, our Nontraditional students are participating in, but not completing our programs. Through our continuous school improvement process, we continue to work on ways to market our programs to recruit and retain, our Nontraditional populations. PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL

Students at The Career Prep Center (CPC) come from each of the district's three home high schools, and the district's alternative high school. Students request the programs at CPC through the class scheduling process that takes place each spring. The programs at CPC are a two-hour block, so in order for students to be enrolled at CPC, they need to have adequate space in their schedule. Since space within the programs offered is limited, priority scheduling is used to place students. District transportation is offered, and students may also use their own transportation.

THE STATUS OF THE 3-5 YEAR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The Career Prep Center is currently in year three of a five-year plan. Last year, the staff at CPC focused on the creation of Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS). The staff underwent specialized professional development related to this goal, created a school wide behavior matrix, and implemented several student-centered initiatives. This year, we continue to focus on the culture of our building as it relates to social and emotional learning. Our staff is committed to becoming a Trauma Informed and Resilient school by undergoing a six hour training and putting in place SEL classroom and building wide practices.

A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH SPECIALIZED SCHOOL

Early Childhood Education is an important part of the mission and vision of Warren Consolidated Schools. A variety of early learning classrooms are housed in our elementary buildings. These programs include WCS Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) Program, the World of Fours (grant-supported preschool program for 4-year-olds), fee-based 3-year-old and 4-year-old preschool, transitional kindergarten, and several Macomb-Intermediate School District Head-Start classrooms.

The Middle School Mathematics Science Technology Center (MS)2TC offers an advanced mathematics, science technology option for middle school students. Students who are accepted into the program will split their day between their home middle school, where they will take their social studies and two elective classes, and Butcher Educational Center, where they will take their mathematics, science, and English language arts classes.

The Middle School Visual and Performing Arts (MS-VPA) is an exciting, creative program that has been designed to build on the district's nationally acclaimed, award-winning high school performing arts program (WCSPA) which is in Sterling Heights High School. MS-VPA is intended for academically focused and creative students who seek to blend their academic experience with interest in the performing arts. Students who are accepted into the program will split their school day between their home middle school, where they will take their language arts, science, and math classes, and Butcher Educational Center, where they will take their social studies and two performing arts electives. The performing arts electives will include visual arts, music, dance, and theatre exploratory experiences.

The Macomb Math and Science Center (MMSTC) is an honors program for 9th – 12th grade students in Macomb County districts who are interested in advanced/accelerated mathematics, science, and computer technology. Students must apply and be selected for the program based upon placement testing and teacher recommendation. The Center's program is a half day and students attend their home school for the remainder of the day. It is located at Butcher Educational Center.

The Career Preparation Center (CPC) programs are open to Clintondale, Fraser, and Warren Consolidated 11th and 12th grade students. CPC programs are designed to provide students with skills to enter the workforce or continue with additional college or workplace training. Career Technical Education (CTE) classes at the CPC provide technical skills and knowledge. Students enrolled in these programs are often able to earn technical certifications as well as college credit. Community High School is an alternative education program for high school students. The primary objective of the school is to assist enrolled students in meeting their high school graduation requirements in a timely manner. It is now located at the Hatherly Educational Center.
