WCS to offer summer extended learning opportunities for students



This summer, WCS is pleased to offer a large selection of summer extended learning opportunities for students to regain what they may have lost this past year due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The district will offer the traditional summer school program for students in grades K-12, as well as K-8 Special Education programs.

"It is extremely important to keep our students engaged during the summer down-time," Superintendent Robert D. Livernois, Ph.D. said. "Our Office of Curriculum and Instruction team has gone above and beyond in crafting a summer literacy plan to support students who may have struggled the past year and to help them be ready for school in August."

WCS will offer elementary literacy and math (by invitation), where students will engage in literacy through thematic units, as well as math concepts and daily SEL checks and activities. Lessons and activities will focus on core content, remediation, and reconnecting students to the school community.

At the middle school level, Math Mindset (by invitation) will be offered where students engage in grade level content while learning about the brain research necessary for a growth mindset in mathematics which incorporates open, creative, and visual thinking. Middle School Literacy is also available for students to take part in daily reading and writing.

Our K-8 Special Education programs (by invitation) consist of Cognitively Impaired Summer Learning Classrooms, Emotionally Impaired, and Cross-Categorical.

WCS will offer 9-12 Credit recovery for students who need to recover credits. Students will engage in flexible synchronous and asynchronous courses.

NEW this summer, WCS will offer a variety of FREE extended learning opportunities for students to explore and engage in activities of their choice.

From literacy and math programs, to STEM exploration, SAT prep, computer coding, theatre and film classes, art, painting, gardening, creative writing, and sports fitness, there is something for every student to rebuild this summer and get ready for the next school year.

All programs are taught by highly qualified WCS teachers and are offered free of charge to students. Classes and programs will be offered at every grade level.

WCS to offer Virtual Academy

As Warren Consolidated Schools prepare for the 2021-2022 school year, the district is proud to offer a Virtual Academy to students, taught by Warren Consolidated Schools highly qualified teachers.

Although WCS will be back to in-person learning full-time next year, the district realizes not all families are or will be comfortable returning to school at this time and would like a virtual option.

The Virtual Academy will be a full day of school, five days per week, with a full schedule for students at all grade levels. A hybrid/part-time option is not available at this time.

Students enrolled in the Virtual Academy must remain in the program for a minimum of one semester/trimester.

Some WCS programs, such as CPC, WCSPA, MSVPA, MS2TC, MMSTC, and Transitional Kindergarten, are structured to be taught in person, have limited staff available to them, and are not available on a virtual platform. Students who hold seats in these programs who choose the Virtual Academy will not lose their spots. Some courses students express interest in may not be available in the event there is not enough enrollment in a course.

WCS will follow the district's published school calendar for the 21/22 school year, which includes full day instruction Monday through Friday, with the exception of previously scheduled half days.

A typical day for a student in the Virtual Academy would be balanced between virtual instruction from a teacher and independent practice on learning activities.

As we prepare to close the 2020-21 school year, I would like to thank our community for their support during this

programs, plus much more.

The district will also offer K-8 summer school options to students looking to brush up on certain skills. Elementary Literacy and Math, Middle School Math Mindset, Middle School Literacy, K-8 Special Programs such as cognitively impaired summer learning classrooms, emotionally impaired, and cross-categorical, plus the 9-12 credit recovery program will be among the courses offered.

Additional information regarding our summer literacy programs and summer school options can be found throughout this newsletter and on the district website WCSKIDS.NET. I do hope you take some time to learn about our literacy options and consider registering your child for one or more of the opportunities.

I would also like to remind our community that WCS offers extensive early childhood and kindergarten programs, including free and tuition based pre-school, transitional kindergarten for students who are not quite ready for a traditional kindergarten experience, kindergarten, and early childhood special education. Program information and online registration is located on the main page of our website.

Once again, thank you for your continued cooperation and support this school year. Please continue to stay safe and be healthy.

District purchases new air purification system

WCS buildings will be equipped with a new Global Plasma Solutions air purification system to fight against COVID-19 and various other pathogens.

Needlepoint bipolar ionization from GPS is a patented technology that safely cleans the air by introducing ions into the space via airflow in a ventilation system, eliminating particulates, odor, and pathogens.

GPS's needlepoint bipolar ionization is an air cleaning system intended to reduce the volume of infectious pathogens by deactivating them and improving the efficiency of filtration solutions.

Installation is currently in progress and is expected to be complete by the end July and ready for school to start in August.

Grissom Mindfulness Center open for students and staff

Grissom Middle School recently held a dedication ceremony of the Grissom Mindfulness Center.

The Mindfulness Center is a place where students and staff have access to mindfulness-based tools and trained staff to help facilitate the management of stress and achieve emotional well-being by activating the body's relaxation response.

The center consists of various stations and spaces to facilitate the practices. There is journaling/writing center, a coloring/crafting center, a large-group space for meditation and other group activities, and a small group conversational center. The room is painted with colors

from the suggested calm classroom palette and is adorned with calming and motivational pieces.

The Grissom Mindfulness Center was made possible through funds provided by the family of former student, Anu Bedi, a grant from Extra Credit Union School Employee Grant Program, and the vision of the Grissom team.

Bedi was a student at Grissom when she, her mother, and her brother, were killed in the Air India Flight 182 tragedy on June 23, 1985. Mr. and Mrs. Bedi have been generous supporters of Grissom.

Warren Consolidated Schools is proud to offer high-quality preschool and transitional kindergarten programs.

WCS is currently accepting registration for these programs which focus on kindergarten preparation.

The programs focus on early childhood objectives for development and learning including: social-emotional, physical health, language, cognitive, literacy, mathematics, science and technology, social studies, the arts, and English Language Acquisition.

The following Early Childhood programs are available:

Transitional Kindergarten—

- FREE full-day program
- Five days per week
- For students who are 5 and are born between September 1 and December 1, who would benefit from an additional year of growth between preschool and kindergarten, or who have limited early childhood experiences
- A program that combines academics with critical social and emotional development standards for students not quite ready for traditional kindergarten

World of Fours—

- Must meet income eligibility guidelines and be a Macomb County resident to qualify
- Half-day and full-day programs available
- Must be 4 years old on or before September 1

Tuition-based Preschool—

- 30 week program
- Classes held at Siersma, Susick, and Wilde Elementary Schools

- For students who will be 3 years of age on or before September 1; Class meets two days per week for two hours
- For students who will be 4 years of age on or before September 1; Class meets four days per week for three hours

Early Childhood Special Education—

- Special Education preschool program for children ages 3-6 with a current IEP
- Offers half-day programs and one full-day program
- Classes taught by a certified special education teacher with one paraprofessional per classroom
- Skills taught include: communication, behavior training, fine motor, gross motor, and preschool academics individualized to the student

Students who receive special education services are eligible to register and take classes through the virtual academy.

The district must determine, for each Special Education student, how to provide "Free and Appropriate Public Education" (FAPE) services.

The district would determine through the IEP process, whether, with special education related and supplemental services, the virtual program can provide the student's FAPE services.

Students enrolled in the Virtual Academy will have the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities at their home schools.

Schoology will continue to serve as the virtual learning hub. Using Schoology allows parents to log into a single site and have access to all of their student's coursework information, regardless of how many children they have.
