WCS Operating Millage Replacement Millage FAQ's

On November 5, 2024, Warren Consolidated Schools' residents will be asked to vote on the district's millage rate to maintain opportunities for our students as we prepare them for college, trade school, the workforce, and beyond.

The operating millage replacement contributes directly to the district's operating budget and assists in maintaining high-quality education programs for students.

Without it, WCS would receive 19 percent less funding for the next 10 years. Programs, class sizes, learning materials, staffing, and extracurricular offerings would be significantly impacted.

The millage impacts only the general fund operating budget and is not related to the capital improvement bond passed in 2022.

This operating millage replacement represents no tax increase for community homeowners on their principal residence.

The millage replacement is different from the capital improvement

bond due to the fact that the capital improvement bond addresses safety and security, technology, and facility improvements across all schools.

While bond funds cannot be used toward annual operating expenses, funds from the operating millage can. Such annual operating expenses include teachers, principals, support staff, coaches, utilities, classroom learning materials, plus much more.

"We are fortunate to live in a community where parents, grandparents, and community members celebrate the many excellent educational opportunities provided to our children," Superintendent of Schools Dr. John C. Bernia, Jr. said. "These opportunities are provided to our students by our extraordinarily committed employees who continue to keep WCS a vibrant and important part of our neighborhoods."

Q: What is requested on the school ballot on November 5, 2024?

A: This proposal would restore and maintain the authority of the Warren Consolidated Schools to levy mills for general school district operating purposes.

Q: Will this increase the property tax rate on my home?

A: No. For WCS homeowners, this millage restoration will extend the current authority for homeowners and will not increase tax rates over the current authorization.

Q: What are the revenues used for?


A: The revenues raised by this millage are used for general operating expenses of the school district. These include salaries, classroom materials, transportation, building maintenance, and other services that support the district's daily oper-

Q: How will this ballot proposal impact WCS homeowners?

A: Under existing law, WCS would levy on principal residence property only that portion of the mills (currently 3.2798 mills) necessary to allow the school district to receive the full revenue per pupil foundation allowance permitted by the State.

Q: What are the details of the **Operating Millage Replacement** proposal for the WCS homeowners (commercial, industrial, and rental properties)?

A: The proposal includes restoring the millage rate to protect against reductions caused by the Headlee Amendment rollbacks. For homeowners, the millage rate is capped at up to 8.5241 mills, of which the district is only levying 3.2798 mills. The operating millage proposal reduces this cap to 6 mills for homeowners. This rate allows the district to maintain necessary funding levels without imposing any new tax increase on primary residences.

District's Operating Millage up for renewal

Our district's operating millage is up for renewal on Tuesday, November 5, 2024. I am proud to

share that we are proposing a 10 -year replacement. It's important that every community member understands the significance of our operating millage.

Every few years we turn to our community to vote on the school operating millage, 79 percent of which is funded by businesses in our area with the other 21 percent from homeowners. This millage comprises almost 20 percent of our operating budget and is primarily used for in-classroom learning such as teachers, support staff, and school principals; books and materials; and programs such as athletics, the fine and performing arts, and many other outstanding extracurricular activities.

We are proud of our school board's diligence in maintaining a balanced budget and cutting unneeded expenses. We are asking for the community to vote on holding this millage rate steady for the next 10 years to maintain opportunities for our students as we prepare them for college, trade school, the workforce, and beyond. This operating millage replacement represents no tax increase for community homeowners on their principal residence.

Q: How does this millage allow WCS to maintain the 18 mills on non-homestead property (commercial, industrial, and rental properties)?

A: By restoring the millage, the district will be able to levy the full 18 mills on non-homestead properties, which include commercial, industrial, and rental residential properties. The district is currently only able to levy 17.5045 mills due to the rollback under the Headlee Amendment. The district must levy 18 mills in order to receive its full per pupil foundation allowance.

Q: What is the maximum levy amount in this operating millage for business owners?

A: For business owners and other non-homestead property owners, the maximum levy amount is 18 mills. This includes commercial, industrial, and rental residential properties. Commercial personal property is exempt from 12 of the current 18 mills.



Q: Who is eligible to vote in the election on Tuesday, November 5, 2024?

A: Any registered voter residing within the boundaries of Warren Consolidated Schools is eligible to vote in this election.

Q: When is Election Day and where do I vote?

A: Election Day is Tuesday, November 5th. Polls are open from 7 am to 8 pm. You can find your voting location through the Secretary of State website: www.michigan.gov/sos

Annual Notices

Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires Warren Consolidated Schools, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Warren Consolidated Schools may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow Warren Consolidated Schools to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- · Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local education agencies (LEA's) receiving assistance under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) 2015 to provide military recruiters, upon request, with the following information—names, addresses and

telephone listings—unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without prior written consent.

If you do not want Warren Consolidated Schools to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing. Warren Consolidated Schools has designated the following information as directory information:

- Student's name
- Address
- Telephone listings
- Electronic mail address
- Photograph
- Date and place of birth
- Maior field of study
- Dates of attendance
- Grade leve
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- · Degrees, honors and awards received
- The most recent educational agency/ institution attended
- Student ID number, user ID, or other unique personal identifier used to communicate in electronic systems that cannot be used to access education records without a PIN, password, etc. (A student's SSN, in whole or part, cannot be used for this purpose).

Integrated Pest Management

The State of Michigan law requires that schools that may apply pesticides on school property must provide an annual advisory to parents or guardians of students attending a facility.

Please be advised that Warren Consolidated Schools utilizes an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approach to control pests. IPM is a pest management system that utilizes all suitable techniques in a total pest management system with the intent of preventing pests from reaching unacceptable levels or to reduce an existing population to an acceptable level. Pest management techniques emphasize sanitation, pest exclusion and biological controls. One of the objectives of using an IPM approach is to reduce or eliminate the need for chemical applications of pesticides. However, certain situations may require the need for pesticides to be utilized.

As required by State of Michigan law, you will receive advance notice regarding the non-emergency application of a pesticide such as an insecticide, fungicide or herbicide, other than a bait or gel formulation that is made to the school grounds or buildings during the school year. Please note that notification is not given for the infestation of stinging insects, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students, but you will be notified following any such application.

Advance notification of pesticide applications, other than a bait or gel formulation, will be given by at least two methods. The first method will be by posting at the main entrance to the school at least 48 hours in advance. The second method will be posting at the school's main office at least 48 hours in advance.

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school are entitled to receive the advance notice of a pesticide application, other than a bait or gel formulation, by first class United States mail postmarked at least three days before the pesticide application, if they so request. If you prefer to receive the notification by first class mail, contact Kenneth Matheny at Elite Pest Management who is contracted and responsible for all inspections and pesticide procedures. Elite Pest Management can be reached at 586-294-7055. The designated district employee responsible for pesticide application procedures is Laura Mabee, Manager of Auxiliary Services (586-698-4446 Imabee@wcskids.net). Forms are also available in the main offices of each school.

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school may review the school's Integrated Pest Management program and records of any pesticide application, upon request.

Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires that each year district workers and building occupants receive notification about asbestos activities such as response actions and inspections. The purpose of this correspondence is to meet those requirements and familiarize you with the asbestos related activities that have been conducted in Warren Consolidated Schools this past year.

Management Plans—In 1998, Warren Consolidated Schools contracted with Asbestos Management Inc. to conduct inspections for asbestos containing material within all district owned buildings. This information was then compiled into Asbestos Management Plans. These Management Plans are kept in each building and are available for review. A copy of each building management plan is also located in the Educational Service Center.

Surveillance Activities—The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) regulation requires surveillance of the condition of AMC every six months and reinspections every three years. The periodic

surveillance was conducted in January 2021. Since the last re-inspection was done in December 2020, the next three years re-inspection will be conducted in December 2023. Both of these surveillance activities will be included as part of the buildings' Management Plans.

Asbestos Abatement—It is anticipated that Warren Consolidated Schools will need to conduct asbestos abatement within its facilities over the next year removing materials such as, but not limited to, floor tile, floor tile mastic, fire doors and fire door frames. All remaining AMC will continue to be maintained under the Operations and Maintenance Program.

Any removal projects will be performed by a Michigan Licensed Asbestos Abatement Contractor and managed by Nova Environmental, Inc., the District's environmental consulting firm.
